
At home Cirque du Soleil performance

'Spy' gorilla robot records wild gorillas

Filmmakers have used a special kind of camera, a robotic 'spy' designed to look like a young gorilla to record wild Silverbacks in Uganda. The robot baby gorilla had lots of life-like features such as realistic eye movements (wild gorillas communicate with each other through eye contact) and could be made to beat on its chest! The gorilla replica captured the mountain gorillas singing while eating their dinner of aquatic plants, flowers and seeds; this has never been filmed before! The gorillas showed how much they were enjoying their food by producing tuneful calls and deep hums while eating. Dr Eva Maria Luef said "Food-associated calling could be an expression of well-being in gorillas when feeding on specific, preferred foods." The footage recorded as part of the PBS series 'Nature: Spy in the Wild 2' shows the gorillas screamed a 'chorus of appreciation' while eating as well as highlighting that they are also extremely gassy.
