3,200-megapixel photo of broccoli

Crews at the Department of Energy's SLAC National Accelerator Laboratory have taken the first 3,200-megapixel digital photos. The largest ever taken in a single shot, with an extraordinary array of imaging sensors that will become the largest camera in the world. This camera will be housed at the Vera Rubin Observatory in Chile. The telescopic camera will explore cosmic mysteries as part of the observatory's Legacy Survey of Space and Time (LSST), a catalogue of galaxies and of the movements of countless astrophysical objects. For now, though, scientists are testing the giant camera's capabilities by taking photos of broccoli. They say that the intricate shapes found in the Romanesco version of this plant are a good check that the threebillion-pixel camera can capture lots of detail.

Comedy Wildlife Photography Awards

The finalists of this year's Comedy Wildlife Photography Awards have been announced. This year's finalists show wild animals in a variety of comedy moments. They include: a fish that appears to smile, a bear giving a friendly wave from afar, a photobombing giraffe, a seal that looks like it's laughing, a vomiting penguin, a baboon scratching it's bottom, and a very grumpy sea turtle. The awards were founded by Paul Joynson-Hicks and Tom Sullam, both professional photographers and passionate conservationists. The competition aims to highlight the extremely important message of wildlife conservation in an engaging and positive way, working with competition partner The Born Free Foundation, an international wildlife charity that campaigns to "Keep Wildlife in the Wild".
