Violinist plays whilst having brain tumour removed

A woman has undergone brain surgery while playing the violin to ensure surgeons did not damage the part of her brain which controls the fine movement of her hands. Dagmar Turner, from the Isle of Wight, played music by Gustav George Gershwin's jazz "Summertime" and songs by Julio Iglesias. To prevent any damage to her violin skills, Professor Keyoumars Ashkan, Consultant Neurosurgeon at King's College Hospital, came up with the plan – they mapped Dagmar's brain, prepared her skull for the operation and then asked her to play as they removed the tumour. She thanked her surgeons, and said "The violin is my passion, I've been playing since I was 10 years old. The thought of losing my ability to play was heart-breaking."

Ghost ship washes up on the rocks in Cork

A large cargo ship from the African coast has washed up on an Irish shore following Storm Dennis. The boat, that is now snagged on rocks near the city of Cork, was known as a "ghost ship," floating around the Atlantic with no one on board. The US Coast Guard had rescued 10 crew members from the vessel in September 2018 and the MV Alta has drifted alone across the ocean for over 17 months. Cork County Council has issued assurance that the 77-metre poses no environmental threat. Ballycotton RNLI Lifeboat Operations manager John Tattan said: "This is one in a million. It has come all the way up from the African coast, west of the Spanish coast, west of the English coast and up to the Irish coast. I have never, ever seen anything abandoned like that before."

'Birdgirl' Mya-Rose Craig awarded honorary doctorate
