Opera House With An Audience Of Plants

An opera house in Barcelona celebrated its reopening with a concert for plants! All of the seats at the Gran Teatre del Liceu were filled with plants from local nurseries. The UceLi Quartet performed Puccini's 'Crisantemi' ('Chrysanthemums') to an audience of 2,292 palms, Ficus trees, and Swiss cheese plants, which were in the red, velvet seats and among the gold balconies. The string quartet's rendition at iconic opera house was said to explore the relationship between art and nature. Hundreds of human listeners also tuned in to stream the less than 8-minute performance at home. After their outing to the opera house, the plants were given to health professionals from the Hospital Clínic de Barcelona, with a certificate as a thank you for all their hard work.

New Lightning World Records

The World Meteorological Organization (WMO) has recently recognised two new world records for a single lightning flash! The record for the longest lightning strike has been broken by a 'megaflash' in Brazil that occurred in October 2018. It was confirmed by WMO to have been 440 metres long! The WMO, the U.N.'s authoritative voice on weather, climate and water, also announced that the world record for the duration of a lightning flash had been broken too. A single flash that developed continuously over northern Argentina in March 2019 lasting for a full 16.73 seconds. Both these records were verified with new satellite lightning imagery technology and were double the previous records.
